TURN UP THE HEAT

As the calendar turns the page into July, one of the first things we encounter is a heat wave. We have learned from Jesus that being "hot" all the time and "cold" all the time is not ideal, but it is a lot better (either one) than being lukewarm. We read in Revelation Chapter 3:

15 "I know your works; you are neither cold nor hot. I wish that you were either cold or hot. **16** So, because you are lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I am about to spit you out of my mouth.

There is something uncomfortable about hearing that. We sometimes want to stay away from the extremes of hot and cold. We want to reside somewhere in the middle. That's climate control comfort!

In the 1600s in Geneva, Switzerland, the reformer John Calvin often called his opponents "lukewarm" or "indifferent" if he considered their faith to be one of convenience or comfort rather than the radical call to personal and community change that Jesus Christ offered to us.

There's where things can get "too hot," however. When we try to apply our own personal piety onto the lies and actions of others. When we hope to alter what faith in action looks like from our perspective into a template for all to follow. That's when we are interpreting the Bible in a way that esteems our own understanding of God's Holy Word rather than as a divine gift that offers hope and peace to all who believe it. Too often, we want to decide what is holy and pure and deride those who disagree.

Even Calvin didn't like that too much. Knowing that the true holiness is not something we can attain, but is rather God's own self that is holy, he wrote: "We should not insist on absolute perfection of the gospel in our fellow Christians, however we may strive for it ourselves." (The Golden Booklet, page 21).

We can strive toward perfection and holiness, we can try to be consistently on fire for God, we can attempt to fan the flames of the Holy Spirit at all times, yet we are still human. We experience sin and pain all around us. We are deeply embedded in systems that produce poverty through others' power or that produce violence through others' wealth.

Rather than press on toward a bolder stance on "hot button" issues, it is much easier to avoid that altogether. But that, Jesus says, makes us distasteful to him. Lukewarm water is no good for cleaning or drinking. Hot can clean and purify, cold can refresh and cool.

Are we called to be lukewarm in today's environment, where sin envelops us in racism, homophobia, opposition to refugees and those experiencing poverty? Even Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was inspired by Jesus's words in Revelation as he contemplated the way Christians can stand alongside the fight for truth and justice in our modern society.

In his Letter from a Birmingham Jail, King wrote: "Shallow understanding from people of good will is more frustrating than absolute misunderstanding from people of ill will. Lukewarm acceptance is much more bewildering than outright rejection."

Within the heat of our days, let us find cool. But in the heat of our conversations and difficult topics to consider, let us not be bystanders but let us turn up the heat. Let us not accept the injustices of our world as someone else's problems. Let us not be lukewarm or distasteful to our Savior Jesus Christ.

That means being bold, beloved. And we have a lot of chances to listen for God's call to do what is right in our world, to spread the Gospel of Jesus and to be spurred to action by the Holy Spirit. This is where we experience God's hope, faith, and love in our lives!
