Pastor's Pen

A Changing Reality

Every year, a variety of polls try to help explain who we are as a society and how things are changing. Many of these polls have names you may recognize: Gallup, Pew Research, Quinnipiac, Nielsen.

The Public Religion Research Institute (PRRI) is a non-profit trying to better understand how Americans feel about religion, specifically Christianity. PRRI recently released its latest poll and it offers some insights into who we are as Christian congregations in America today.

One key learning from this study was that fewer and fewer white Americans identify as Christians. In 2006, nearly 57% of Americans identified as both white and Christian, a majority. In 2022, that is down to barely 40%, which, while still the largest demographic, is no longer more than half of the nation's people.

While the number of Americans who identify as white has decreased over that time by 6%, white Americans identifying as Catholic has decreased 21%, as mainline Protestant is down 22% (includes Presbyterians), and evangelical Protestant is down a whopping 41%. In fact, there are now more white American Christians who identify as mainline than who identify as evangelical. The flip side is that those Americans identifying as white and religiously unaffiliated has risen by a jump of 74%!

How did this happen?

The two most common reasons given by those people who were once part of Christian churches and are no longer affiliated with religion are the negative teachings toward LGBTQ+ folks and a growing distance between the beliefs and actions shown by churches.

Some pundits are quick to blame the decline in churches for allowing societal values to trump the biblical values of Christianity. In particular, the influence of antiracism or LGBTQ+ inclusion are cited as "wayward" directions for American churches and these theories are readily repeated by many pastors and politicians.

However, the fact that folks are leaving churches that are more likely to exclude LGBTQ+ persons or to discourage using antiracism resources tells a very different story. That fewer white Americans are finding churches compatible with living out their faith is having a profound effect on Christianity.

What might we as FPC learn from this? Does our commitment to boldly loving God and boldly loving neighbor connect with our beliefs, values, and actions? Are we a safe and attractive place for Christians who feel that the church has abandoned them, either in word or in deed?

As we spread the Good News, may we follow Christ and seek the Spirit's guidance as we consider these challenging questions together.

FPC MUSTARD SEED REPORT

The FPC Mustard Seed is a Christian Service program dedicated to helping local families and individuals in need become financially self-supporting and holistically healthy. The program was created by the Adult Sunday School class (and approved by Session) in 2008 in response to a class study of poverty from economic, social and biblical perspectives. The Mustard Seed is a complement to the FPC Pastor Benevolence program, which provides short-term, emergency assistance to pay for essentials such as food, utilities, and gasoline. The Mustard Seed Committee engages in longer-term and more holistic relationships with individuals and families to help them become self-sustaining based on an agreement jointly developed and signed by the Committee and the people asking for help. Some of the more common types of assistance provided by the Mustard Seed include budgeting and financial decisionmaking, purchase of inexpensive used cars to enable people to get to work, essential home repair, and advice on healthy diets and lifestyles. Preference is given to families with minor children. Mustard Seed expenditures are considered a loan. The majority of loans (but not all) have been repaid. The program is funded by donations from members of the FPC congregation.

The committee members are Linda Knight, Prentice Knight, Caren Gibson, Larry Gibson, Marcella Davis and Curry Davis. The committee members will be happy to answer any questions you have about the program.
