Let Freedom Ring!

At the beginning of early July, we see the Red, the White, the Blue decorations everywhere. We witness the familiar site of the tent stores popping up around town with the best fireworks you can ever (legally) find!

The core of the celebration of Independence Day is the joy of freedom. Our nation was forged under the idea that people should be free to govern themselves, to not be subject to authorities beyond their own experiences and situations.

The colonists did not feel they were well treated by the British empire. They wished for freedom from a system built to keep wealth where it currently resided, in the landowning estates of the lords of the British system of Parliament.

The ideas for American freedom were built to expand and offer a more transparent government of representation for the colonists to determine their own futures.

We know now, however, that while the American Revolution did lead to a world-changing democracy that inspires many others around the world, not all were free on July 4, 1776.

The colonists had already removed Indigenous Peoples from their lands. They had imported kidnapped Africans and instituted chattel slavery. In the same breath where the Declaration of Independence says that "all men are created equal," many of the signers owned human beings and resided on lands formerly the home of native peoples.

Juneteenth recently became a federal holiday that commemorates the revelation of their freedom to the last group of enslaved Black folks in Texas, more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation.

One of the originators of the federal holiday, Opal Lee, envisioned a weeks-long celebration of Freedom from Juneteenth to July Fourth that covered ALL Americans.

An important part of the "New Democracy" of the United States was the Freedom of Religion. Most colonists had come from state-sponsored religious backgrounds, or at least the political struggle of changing faces of politics and religion. When one (almost always Christian) faith tradition was in charge, it was hard to be anything else.

The Freedom of Religion in America was meant to include ALL religions, not just Christianity.

Yet so often today, we hear the retelling of history that America was founded as an explicitly Christian nation. And even were that so, how much more damning is it that the United States began as a nation that still held chattel slavery and the removal of Indigenous Peoples to be morally and spiritually "right"?

Today, we have the opportunity to express what true Freedom really is. For we are given Freedom in Christ, a freedom well beyond all that we can imagine. It is not limited by political freedom to worship as we want.

Freedom in Christ means that we are Free to live as Christ lived. For we follow a Lord who knows us, who has experienced life as we do, who knew what it meant to live in a land of Empire and colony. To be an ethnic minority, to be poor.

Freedom in Christ means Freedom for All. The wholeness of our being as humans created by God and meant for a purpose beyond our own edification and pleasure. The Freedom to make a better world here and now for all people, reflecting the teaching and healing of Jesus Christ.

The wholeness of creation and community under God is what Rev. Dr,. Martin Luther King, Jr. spoke of in his Beloved Community, the kingdom of God happening in our own world, here and now.

Let Freedom Ring for all people this Independence Day! We no longer live under the tyranny of sin or hatred or death. We are FREE from it all by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ!

To God be the Glory and Let Freedom Ring!

Clothes Closet Update

It is hard to believe, but we have gone through the 800+ pairs of underwear we collected in December. So we are doing a "Christmas in July Undie Sunday" on July 23rd. Both men and women's underwear are needed, all sizes.

We recently have stocked our shelves with lots of new, donated summer clothes from several local sources. The joy on the client's faces when they pick out NEW clothes for their children is heartwarming!

Our community volunteers also continue to grow. We currently have 4 volunteers who work on a weekly basis as well as generous monthly donations from Zion Lutheran Church. Nine FPC volunteers work hard every week. Meredith even brought Everett, Lizzy, and Sydney to work for a few hours getting new clothes put out on racks. What hard workers they were!

Receiving a \$15,000 grant from the Presbytery has allowed us to purchase shelving for the lower basement (The Catacombs) to better organize our storage clothing. We typically give out 500+ items of clothing, toiletries, and limited food items each week.

Current needs include:

- Men's jeans in sizes 30-38
- Men's socks and belts
- Men and women's new underwear

If you have clothes to donate, we ask you to do the following:

- Wash and fold neatly. Bringing on hangers is also helpful.
- Separate by winter/summer
- Separate by men/women/children
- If you place the separated items in small to medium boxes, that helps a lot. Garbage bags tend to wrinkle the clothes and make it hard to process.

These steps may seem tedious for you, but we get so many donations that processing clothes is our biggest task. Following the above steps really allows us to get the clothes on shelves quicker. Thanks for the wonderful support FPC gives to make the Matthew 25 Community Clothes Closet a big success!
