Pastor's Pen

New Beginnings

So, if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! – 2 Corinthians 5:17

Do you ever think about why we celebrate New Year's Day? It's really just another day, so why is it so important for people to mark a date change on a calendar?


I think it's because a new year provides a fresh start. There's a reason January is the busiest month for gyms and diet programs—it's seen as a new opportunity to begin again and improve oneself. It naturally feels like a good time to start something new, which is why many people make New Year's resolutions (whether they keep them or not is another matter!).

The Christian life provides many chances for fresh starts, for changing what we've been doing or beginning to live differently. Each week in worship, we start with a time of confession where we admit what we've done wrong. We confess to God and to each other that our lives are not perfect, that we're not living the way we should, that we're doing things we shouldn't do and neglecting to do things we should.

Then, immediately after confession, we hear God's response. We receive the good news that, because of God's forgiveness and His love for us, we all get a fresh start. Psalm 103:12 says God has taken our sins away from us "as far as the east is from the west." The slate is wiped clean. We don't need to carry the weight of our sins or guilt anymore. We are forgiven!

And then we encounter the next week (or maybe just the next day... or the next few minutes!), and it doesn't take long before we sin again. It doesn't take long for us to forget what God has done for us. We take the burden Jesus has removed from us, and we pick it back up, trying to carry the weight of our own sins once more. But we always have another chance to remember God's love. God never grows tired of forgiving us!

You don't need to wait for a new year to begin again. Every day is a new chance to wake up and remember that you are a baptized child of God. You have been claimed, redeemed, and set free by Jesus Christ. After hearing the promise of forgiveness and absolution in worship, we continue on the only path we can: together giving joyful thanks to God in song and learning more about God's grace and love for us through His word. MAKING CONNECTIONS

Merry Christmas, everybody!

I learned about the Twelve Days of Christmas when I was an adult. I sang the song enthusiastically as a child but had no idea what all these days were. Now, I am grateful for a Christmas that lasts twelve whole days, until Epiphany. Christmas Eve is a rush towards the service, and Christmas Day is a rush of presents and visits and sometimes a little deflated feeling in the late afternoon, and the whole thing seems to be over awfully quickly.

But if Christmas is twelve days long, then I can take a minute to just... be in it. To hang out. To be still in a moment of quiet. To consider that my savior was born and didn't just disappear, and the gift of Jesus doesn't expire on December 26, or January 2. Also, I will nap, and when I wake up, it will still be Christmas. What a luxury and a relief, to have a little more time.

It's easy to forget that most of life, even most of a Christian life, is kind of ordinary. It happens only over time. You can't live a life in a day, or accumulate a lifetime's experience with God in a day, either. Jesus' disciples following him around, getting hungry or sweaty or cold or bored or annoyed or tired for three years, give or take. And we can do the same, for as many years as we have.

This year, we'll talk about discipleship a lot. (What a loaded word!) What is it? What does it mean? How do we do it? And one big thing about it is that we do it over time. Day by day. Annie Dillard, a writer, wrote a book about writing in which she says: "How we spend our days is, of course, how we spend our lives. What we do with this hour, and that one, is what we are doing." This is also true about being a Christian, that is, a disciple of Christ. With this hour, and that one, spending our days in the daily effort until we have spent our lives.

As always, this daily effort begins in our community's new year with Room in the Inn. Our first night of service is Wednesday, January 7. This is a good place to practice doing, in the ordinary way, what Jesus has told us to do. And practice, of course, makes perfect. Let's start there.

And then, let's walk together through this year, observing what we do, how we spend our days. Many things we do—many places we give our time, love, energy—can connect to our following Jesus where he leads us. Let's practice together.

The Matthew 25 Clothes Closet had a very successful 2024. More detailed data will be shared later in our annual report. But the numbers below are pretty impressive. Numbers in () are from 2023 and (()) from 2022.

People Served - 2938 (2390) ((1289)) Items Given Away - 20,231 (18,524) ((10,052))

In our Christmas Shop, we served 180 people and gave 449 gifts away. Our congregation's generosity is what made this possible. One member gave \$100 for us to spend as needed, so we were able to fill in areas where we didn't have enough. We actually will have quite a few toys to save for next year. A big thanks to Nancy Thomas who worked EVERY Tuesday and Thursday and to these people who worked one or more days: Sylvia Pulliam, Betsy Sheppard, Linda Knight, and Linda Lee.



SUNDAY SCHOOL BEGINNING 1/4: A Long Obedience in the Same Direction

Beginning the first Sunday in January, the adult Sunday School class will begin reading <u>A Long Obedience in the Same</u> Direction: Discipleship in an Instant Society, by Eugene Peterson (author of, most famously, The Message, but also Run With Horses and many other books on Christian spirituality and practice). We'll get oriented and begin considering what we think of when we think of "discipleship" on January 4, read Chapter 1 on our own during the week, and discuss Chapter 1 together on January 11. Books are available on the high table in the parlor. If you'd like more in-depth study or devotional work, you can also pick up the "extra study" Bible Study Companion to the book (optional!). No cost, but a donation of \$15 or any amount will go back into the book-buying "pot."
